

Rolz-Bennett Visits U.N. Force

Mr. Jose Rolz-Bennett, UN Under-Secretary-General for Special Political Affairs, paid a two-day visit to Cyprus (26-28 April) during which he held a series of meetings with UNFICYP officials.

Mr. Rolz-Bennett arrived in Cyprus from Teheran where he participated in the International Conference on Human Rights which opened there on 22 May with an address by the Secretary-General, U Thant (See **BLUE BERET**, 24 April 1968).

On leaving Nicosia Sunday morning, Mr. Rolz-Bennett told reporters at the airport that during his visit he had also met with President Makarios and the Turkish Cypriot leadership. In his meetings, Mr. Rolz-Bennett said, he had impressed upon them — on behalf of the Secretary-General — the "desirability indeed of the necessity" to have talks

between the parties get underway before the present mandate of the UN Force expires on 27 June.

Secretary-General Calls For Agreement on Site For Viet-Nam Talks

UN Secretary-General, U Thant, last week "fervently" appealed to all the parties directly involved in the war in Viet-Nam to try to create a more favourable atmosphere for the preliminary talks which the United States and the Democratic Republic of Viet-Nam have agreed to undertake.

At the same time, the Secretary-General appealed to Washington and to Hanoi to agree without any further delay on a venue for the talks.

U Thant noted that three weeks had elapsed since they had agreed to hold the talks, and he said it seemed to him that the range of choice had now narrowed to a few cities. Among them Warsaw and Paris could, in his view, be regarded as suitable sites.

Meanwhile, said the Secretary-General, it was disturbingly clear that the war in Viet-Nam was raging unabated. He noted that bombing raids above the 17th Parallel in the past weeks were reported to be more intensive than ever before although the area of the bombing was more limited.

U Thant also referred to the signs that fighting in the South would increase in intensity. Such a situation, he declared, was far from propitious for meaningful preliminary talks.

BRITCON Rotation Underway

A partial rotation of the British Contingent serving with the United Nations Force in Cyprus begins today, Wednesday, 1 May.

The 1st Battalion The Durham Light Infantry will be arriving from the United Kingdom and will take over duties in UNFICYP'S Limassol Zone from the 1st Battalion The Royal Green Jackets, commanded by Lt Col F.E. Kitson, OBE, MC, who have been serving with the U.N. Force here since November 1967.

Lt Col J.H. Jacob, MC, commanding the Durham Light Infantry, who arrived in Cyprus yesterday, 30 April, will take over command of UNFICYP's Limassol Zone on 3 May 1968.

The rotation of the British battalions should be completed by Sunday.

U.S. Contribution To UNFICYP Costs

The United States is prepared to make an additional voluntary contribution of up to two million dollars towards the cost of the UN Force in Cyprus.

In a note sent to the Secretary-General, dated 11 April, the Permanent Representative of the United States to the UN said that the United States is prepared to make this contribution towards the three month (27 March — 26 June 1968) cost of UNFICYP.

The amount ultimately contributed to the United States against this pledge, the US note said, will depend on the contributions of other governments toward the cost of the operation.




HIGH IN THE HILLS


Överste Lavén har tidigare tjänstgjort som bataljonschef på Cypern, nämligen sommaren 1966.



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
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DOWN ON THE FARM

UNFICYP SECRETARIAT MEMBER SPROUTS WINGS

US, Soviet Union Submit Non-Proliferation Treaty

The United States and the Soviet Union told the 124-nation UN General Assembly last week that their draft treaty against the further spread of atomic weapons should be promptly endorsed to help lift the nuclear threat from mankind and open the way to disarmament and a more secure and prosperous peace for all.

Opening the nuclear non-spreading debate in the Assembly's main Political Committee, Ambassador Arthur Goldberg of the United States and Deputy Foreign Minister Kuznetsov of the Soviet Union said that the draft — with related UN Security Council pledge — would enhance the safety of those nations forswearing the dubious benefits of nuclear arsenals and widen their access to peaceful nuclear technology.

Both representatives stressed that the treaty, put forward jointly at the Geneva Disarmament Conference earlier this year, was a compromise embracing the views of many States of various political hues, and worked out over a long period of intense negotiations. Both also warned that if the hazards of an ever increasing number of nuclear powers were to be avoided, the time to act was now.

At the outset of the opening meeting on this question, a statement from the UN Secretary-General, U Thant, was read out saying that the further proliferation of nuclear weapons could set off a chain reaction with direct consequences on the security

GENERAL ASSEMBLY RENEWS SESSION AT UN HEADQUARTERS

The UN General Assembly resumed its 22nd regular annual session last week at UN Headquarters in New York under the presidency of Mr Cornelius Manescu, Foreign Minister of Romania.

A draft treaty to prevent the further spread of atomic weapons is a major issue before the Assembly and is being dealt with by the Main Political Committee, while the question of South-West Africa is being taken up in plenary session. The Middle East situation is also on the agenda.

Before proceeding with its regular business, the Assembly voted by acclamation to admit its 124th U.N. Member — the small island of Mauritius, a former British colony set in the Indian Ocean some five hundred miles east of Madagascar.

Speakers from all regions of the world took the floor during the opening meeting of the resumed session last Wednesday to welcome the new State, which pledged its collaboration with all United Nations Members in the shaping of a better world.

Of the issues before the resumed Assembly session, the preventing of further proliferation of atomic weapons has

been given increasingly urgent attention by the Assembly for close to a decade — and has received first priority in disarmament discussions for over the past two years.

As to the Middle East, the Arab-Israeli conflict was placed on the Assembly's agenda last fall — following earlier consideration at a special Assembly session. The debate, however, was held off because of consultations that led to a UN Security Council resolution laying down the principles of settlement following the June war, and the dispatching of a special UN peace envoy to the area. The envoy, Ambassador Gunnar Jarring, has been there for some months.

UN Group Will Press Efforts To Enter S-W Africa

The UN General Assembly meeting at UN Headquarters in New York was informed last Friday that efforts of the UN Council for South West Africa to take over the administration of the Territory had so far been frustrated by South Africa's defiance of UN decisions, but that the Council would proceed with its plan to enter the Territory as soon as certain issues were resolved.

The Council was established as a follow-up to the Assembly's decision to terminate South Africa's old League of Nations mandate in South West Africa and to place the Territory under the UN's direct responsibility until it achieved independence.

The 11-member Council was asked to set up an interim administration pending independence.

South Africa maintains that the UN had no authority to terminate its mandate and no right to interfere in her administration of the Territory.

UK MOVES TOTAL ECONOMIC BOYCOTT AGAINST RHODESIA

The United Kingdom last week proposed that the 15-nation UN Security Council impose a total economic boycott against Rhodesia in a new effort to bring down the rebel minority regime of Mr. Ian Smith.

Lord Caradon of Great Britain introduced a draft resolution to the Council demanding that Member States: ban imports to and exports from Rhodesia, prevent investment in the Territory, and deny entry into their territories of anyone travelling on a Rhodesian passport — save on

exceptional humanitarian grounds.

Lord Caradon presented the draft as an effective means of showing the illegal regime in Rhodesia that its continued usurpation of power could not succeed and could only lead to political isolation and economic stagnation.
