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FORCE COMMANDER'S APPOINTMENT EXTENDED

## BERNARDES RESIGNS

P.P. SPINELLI TO  
BE TEMPORARY  
REPRESENTATIVE

**O**N WEDNESDAY, 21 DECEMBER, UN SECRETARY-GENERAL U THANT ANNOUNCED — WITH "PLEASURE" — THE EXTENSION OF THE APPOINTMENT OF LT.-GENERAL I.A.E. MARTOLA as Commander of the United Nations Force in Cyprus. Lt. General Martola has commanded the Force since 17 May 1966 and will continue in his post for the duration of the present mandate of the Force which expires on 26 June 1967.

At the same time, the Secretary-General also announced "with regret" the resignation, effective 5 January 1967, for "pressing personal reasons", of Mr. Carlos A. Bernardes as his Special Representative in Cyprus. Mr. Bernardes has served with "great distinction", said the Secretary-General, as his Special Representative since his appointment on 26 September 1964. In announcing his resignation, U Thant paid tribute to the "outstanding skill and devotion" with which Mr. Bernardes has carried out his task.

The Secretary-General said that Mr. P.P. Spinelli, UN Under-Secretary, Director-General of the United Nations Office at Geneva, had agreed to act temporarily as his Special Representative after the departure of Mr. Bernardes.

# ASSEMBLY SESSION CLOSES

### VIET-NAM PEACE APPEAL BY PRESIDENT

THE TWENTY-FIRST REGULAR SESSION OF THE UNITED NATIONS GENERAL ASSEMBLY ENDED LAST TUESDAY EVENING FOLLOWING THIRTEEN WEEKS OF DEBATE AND ACTION ON A WIDE RANGE OF PROBLEMS AFFECTING THE PEACE AND WELL-BEING OF MANKIND. Describing the session as "more positive" in mood than any previous one, the Assembly's President, Ambassador Abdul Rahman Pazhwak of Afghanistan, closed with a personal appeal for peace in Viet-Nam.

Mr. Pazhwak called for all those engaged in the Viet-Nam war to declare that they sought only a peaceful solution and to make contacts for peace negotiations. He urged that formal public commitments to this effect be made during the Christmas and New Year truce periods.

The Assembly President said that his appeal should

not be linked with other proposals on the Viet-Nam conflict and that the peace statements he asked for should come before all other steps except the two truces already agreed on.

He declared that the Uni-

between the warring parties would only be preliminary — to discuss terms of negotiation. But this, he said, would be "the beginning of a beginning for an honourable understanding." Mr. Pazhwak also spoke warmly

the Assembly session, the President hailed U Thant's re-election for a five-year term and noted the Secretary-General's confidence that progress could be made towards an agreement on peace-keeping principles and restoring UN finances.

Mr. Pazhwak described the outer-space-for-peace treaty approved by the Assembly as "a milestone in man's newest venture" adding that "what is good for the moon is surely good for our own planet."

The Assembly President considered that the final stages of the colonial era were in sight and that the Assembly had taken an historic step in declaring South Africa's mandate over South-West Africa ended and moving to bring independence to that territory. Mr. Pazhwak also stressed the importance of the Human Rights Covenants approved by the Assembly and steps calling for greater aid to poor nations.

A statement issued by the United States delegation to the UN on Wednesday of last week affirmed the "unconditional willingness to seek a peaceful solution to the Viet-Nam conflict" of the United States and "to engage in discussions to this end."

Earlier in the week, on Monday, the US had asked the Secretary-General to do whatever he thought necessary to bring about discussions that could lead to an extended ceasefire with a view to a peace settlement.

ted Nations could obviously not intervene formally — but it was equally clear, he said, that most nations could not remain unconcerned at the tragedy and the danger that it might involve the whole planet.



## RAF Detachment settles down

EQUIPPED WITH THREE OF THE LATEST VERSION of the Wessex tactical support helicopter, the UNFICYP Detachment of 72 Squadron RAF became operational on December 10 when it took over all tasking from 18 Squadron. In its first fourteen days of operation, the Detachment carried some three hundred personnel and some 70,000 lbs of equipment.

The Squadron is normally based at Odham in Hampshire, but in its task of tactical support for

Britain's Strategic Reserve, has already this year served in France, Holland, Italy, Malta and Libya. The role of the UNFICYP Detachment is mainly re-supply of isolated outposts — some in places almost inaccessible from the ground — with rations and mail and the rotation of personnel. Casualty evacuation is the other main duty of the unit.

The Detachment, commanded by Flight Lieutenant Peter Faid, has a complement of six aircar and fifteen technicians.

# SEASONS' GREETINGS

## TO UNITED NATIONS PERSONNEL

Following is the text of United Nations Secretary-General, U Thant's Christmas message to all who serve in the United Nations:

"On the eve of starting a new five-year term as Secretary-General, it is natural that my first thoughts should be directed to all those who are serving the United Nations in New York, Geneva and other parts of the world. Fol-

lowing the final decision which I reached after many months of searching and reflection, I am

sure members of the staff will understand my personal desire to express to them, indeed to associate them with my reasoned hopes for the Organization we are all privileged to serve.

It is my considered view that a new chapter in the life of the Organization is about to be written. To those who have already devoted so many years of their lives to the United Nations, I wish I could give an assurance that the next five years will demonstrate such advances in international co-operation and such progress towards peace as will reward our expectations. This, however, I am not in a position to do. At the same time, I am convinced that, however difficult, the period ahead will be a crucial one for the Organization. Be it in Asia, or in Africa, or in the Middle East, the challenges to peace are formidable. Only the coming years can tell whether the international community will be capable of rising to meet these challenges. Inasmuch as the Secretariat has an essential contribution to make to the success of the United Nations, I am sure every member of the staff will continue to give high priority on his personal agenda to those qualities of

competence, integrity and initiative which have always been in times of crisis the distinctive mark of the international civil servant.

As I have already indicated, my attention will be turned in the coming months to those "organizational and other administrative improvements" to which I referred in my acceptance speech before the General Assembly on 2 December. In particular, I shall have constantly in mind the interest of the staff in the outstanding issues concerning their conditions of service. While I count on your skill, your good will and your enthusiasm, you may rest assured that for my part I will make every effort to solve these issues with all the fairness and consideration for your legitimate hopes that you may expect from the Secretary-General.

On this occasion, I extend to all of you my sincere good wishes for a new period of common dedication to the higher purposes of the Organization. Let me include also in my wishes all members of your families, for they share in our frustrations and our hopes.

Let us be proud that, by continuing to serve an Organization

which aims at representing and thereby improving the state of

the world, we join in the corps of

privileged men and women who, throughout history, have devoted

their lives to the noble and un-

ceasing task of making this world a better place in which to live.

May the New Year bring you all much happiness!

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

## ACCIDENT FIGURES FALL

### LOWEST TOTAL FOR FIVE MONTHS

FORCE ACCIDENT FIGURES FOR NOVEMBER WERE THE LOWEST FOR FIVE MONTHS according to figures recently made available at the Force Headquarters in Nicosia. During the month, UNFICYP vehicles covered a total of almost one and a quarter million miles and were involved in twenty-three accidents.

Once again the Swedish and Irish Contingents led the way covering a total of 129,170 and 90,111 miles respectively without an accident.

Injury figures remained the same — at seven — with three cases requiring hospitalization, one less than the previous month.

### Latin America and the Far East.

In 1950, Mr. Spinelli was sent to Mogadiscio as Executive Assistant to the Italian Administrator of the United Nations Trust Territory of Somaliland. He also served as Special Representative for the Trust Territory at meetings of the United Nations Trusteeship Council. Subsequently, he was named Secretary-General of Somaliland's Trusteeship Administration and, in 1955, he became alternate Director-General for Emigration in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Rome.

In November 1957, Mr. Spinelli was appointed Director of the United Nations Office (at the time of the appointment, the European Office of the United Nations) at Geneva.

The following year the Secretary-General of the United Nations appointed Mr. Spinelli his Special Representative in Jordan, and in November 1963 his Special Representative and head of the Yemen Observation Mission.

Mr. Spinelli's other United Nations assignments include his appointment as Special Representative of the Secretary-General in the former Trust Territory of Togoland under French administration.

Following the resignation, effective 5 January 1967, of Mr. Carlos A. Bernardes of Brazil, Mr. Spinelli has been temporarily appointed the Secretary-General's Special Representative in Cyprus. Mr. Spinelli already served as the Secretary-General's Personal Representative in Cyprus in March 1964, and as the United Nations Acting Mediator for Cyprus, following the illness of the then UN Mediator, Ambassador Sakari Tuomioja, in August 1964.

Mr. Spinelli acted as the Secretary-General's Special Representative during the negotiations and arrangements which preceded the visit of Pope Paul VI to the United Nations Headquarters in October 1965, and accompanied His Holiness on the flight to and from New York.

## NORWAY MAKES TWO FURTHER CONTRIBUTIONS TO FORCE FINANCES

NORWAY HAS INFORMED THE UNITED NATIONS THAT IT WILL MAKE TWO FURTHER VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS to the cost of the United Nations Force in Cyprus.

In a letter, dated 12 December 1966, the Norwegian Permanent Representative to the UN, Mr. Edward Hambro, told U Thant that Norway would contribute the amount of 100,000 dollars to the cost of the UN Force in Cyprus for the period between 26 June and 26 December 1966.

Furthermore, Mr. Hambro said that "in view of the critical financial situation of the United Nations Peace-Keeping Force in Cyprus", Norway had also decided to make a further contribution of approximately 20,000 dollars towards meeting the deficit in the account of UNFICYP.

## COVENANTS SIGNED

THE TWO COVENANTS ON HUMAN RIGHTS, one on economic, social and cultural rights and the other on civil and political rights, and an optional protocol to the latter — which were approved by the UN General Assembly before it concluded its work this month — were opened for signature last week at UN Headquarters.

The Covenant on Civil and Political Rights was signed by Costa Rica, Cyprus, Honduras, Israel, Jamaica and the Philippines.

The Covenants will come into force after 35 States have become parties to it by depositing instruments of ratification or accession with the Secretary-General.



MANDATE EXTENDED — The UN Security Council is shown above as it unanimously decided — on 15 December 1966 — to extend the stationing of the United Nations Force in Cyprus for a further period of six months, until 26 June 1967, "in the expectation that sufficient progress towards a solution by then will make possible a withdrawal or substantial reduction of the Force". The action in extending the stationing of UNFICYP was taken in adopting a draft resolution submitted by Argentina, Japan, Jordan, Mali, Nigeria, Uganda and Uruguay.
