## U.N. BUDGET MAY TOP \$141 MILLION MARK NEXT YEAR

A BUDGET OF SOME \$141.6 MILLION HAS BEEN PROPOSED BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL for the United Nation's regular operations in 1968.

This gross expenditure would represent an increase of \$12.3 million over the 1967 figure.

A request for additional staff to fill more than 500 new posts, mainly in the economic and social field, is the largest single factor in the projected budget rise.

A reduction of \$5.6 million in the Secretary-General's estimates has been recommended by the General Assembly's Advisory Committee on Budgetary Questions.

U Thant's estimates and the Advisory Committee's recommendations will be examined at the forthcoming session of the General Assembly.

## THE UNITED NATION'S SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON DE-COLONIZATION IS CONTINUING TO CONSIDER THE QUESTION OF GIBRALTAR.

The British sovereignty over the Rock has been hotly contested by Spain who declared it to be part of Spain and has asked that it be turned over to her.

Last year, the General Assembly called on Britain and Spain to continue their negotiations.

However, the talks were broken off when both countries charged each other with the lack of cooperation.

During the Committee's debate, Britain's John Shaw said that his country had made an important contribution toward decolonization of Gibraltar when it announced last June that a referendum would be held in September so that the people of Gibraltar

## US-USSR AGREE TO CHECK NUCLEAR ARMS SPREAD

IN GENEVA LAST WEEK, THE SOVIET AND THE UNITED STATES introduced a draft treaty to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons.

### U Thant Hails Nuclear Draft

THE SECRETARY-GENERAL HAS HAILED SUBMISSION BY THE SOVIET UNION AND THE UNITED STATES of a draft treaty to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons.

Recalling his frequent warnings about the grave dangers of nuclear proliferation, U Thant said it was a matter of deep satisfaction to him that the first step toward a non-proliferation agreement had been taken last week with the introduction of the Soviet-U.S. draft at the Eighteen-Nation Committee on Disarmament in Geneva.

The Secretary-General expressed hope that outstanding problems would be settled soon so that the treaty would receive wide support and pave the way to cessation of the nuclear arms race.

Separate but identical drafts were submitted by the USSR and the US to a 17-nation disarmament negotiating committee, which has been seeking agreement on arms limitation in general and steps to avert a nuclear threat in particular.

The United Nations General Assembly has repeatedly urged that the highest priority be given to the agreement on nonproliferation.

Under the treaty proposed by the US and USSR, adhering nuclear states would undertake not to transfer to any recipient whatsoever nuclear weapons or other nuclear explosive devices, directly or indirectly. They would also be bound in no way to assist or encourage any non-nuclear state to manufacture or otherwise acquire such weapons or have control over them. Non-nuclear states who became parties to the treaty would undertake not to receive transfer of nuclear weapons or explosive devices directly or indirectly. They would also be bound not to manufacture or otherwise acquire such weapons and not to seek or receive any assistance in their manufacture.

The draft treaty stresses that none of its provisions shall be interpreted as affecting the inalienable right of all parties to develop research, production and use of nuclear energy for peaceful purposes, as well as to participate in the fullest possible exchanges toward further development of the peaceful use of the atom.

## KING CONSTANTINE VISITS UN HEADQUARTERS IN N.Y.








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
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## SAPPERS JOIN



## THE BOOK OF KELLS



A PRICELESS MANUSCRIPT, IT IS A COPY OF THE FOUR GOSPELS IN LATIN.

It is famous for its most intricate decorations built up out of old Celtic patterns, stylised birds and beasts, humans and ferocious monsters; its incredible fineness of detail which is capable of enormous magnification on the screen, and the beauty and richness of its colours. Originally it was a single volume, but in 1953 it was rebound into four volumes — one for each Gospel. It contains 340 folios with the beginning and end missing, probably since 1007 AD when its golden shrine was stolen and the Book itself hidden under a sod for some time. The leaves prepared, and the inks used are rich brownish-black, blue-black, red, yellow and mauve. The script is a monumental Irish majuscule first used towards the end of the 6th Century.




A detail from THE BOOK OF KELLS.

## MONASTERY OF KELLS

The Monastery of Kells County Meath, an ancient market town 40 miles North-West of Dublin, first came into prominence with the arrival of the Columban fathers in 806 AD. They had been driven from Iona, a little island off Mull in the Scottish Hebrides, by the Norse invaders. The Book, which certainly took many years to paint, probably dates from the first half of the ninth century and the work of several artists has been distinguished. It was presented to the Library of Trinity College, Dublin, by Henry Jones, who became bishop of Meath in 1661.

## STUDY OF THE PAINT

A microscopic study of the paint has shown that the range of pigments used includes reds from red lead and the cochineal insect, blues from the lapis lazuli of Central Asia, yellows from orpiment and yellow ochre, bright greens from verdigris, olive from a mixture of orpiment and indigo, purples and mauves from folium (a Mediterranean plant), browns from the same and also from ox-gall, white from white lead. The binding medium is generally egg white. Some pigments were laid on so thickly as to give an effect of relief. Others have been laid one over the other, as many as three different colours, each one visible. The Book may be viewed by visitors to the library of Trinity College Dublin.





## S-G ASKS ISRAEL EXTEND REFUGEE CUT-OFF DATE

A UNITED NATIONS SPOKESMAN SAID LAST WEEK THAT THE SECRETARY-GENERAL HAS ASKED ISRAEL to extend the 31 August cut-off date for the return of Arab refugees to the Israeli-controlled territory on the west bank of the Jordan River.

The Spokesman said U Thant had made the request to Israel's Permanent Representative, Gideon Ralhaspm.

In making his appeal, U Thant said he hoped a sufficient amount of time would be allowed beyond 31 August so that all those wishing to return to the west bank could do so.

Meanwhile, the United Nations flag was raised last week over Government House, Headquarters of the United Nations Truce Supervision Organization in Jerusalem.

This was in line with U Thant's authorization to General Odd Bull, Chief of UNTSO, to move back into Headquarters, which had been evacuated last June when the Arab-Israeli war broke out.

Since that time, it has been in Israeli hands.

with Britain.

He said Britain would welcome the presence of a UN representative at the referendum and added that, even if the people of Gibraltar voted to retain their connection with Britain, his government would see that they could, at any future time, change their minds and vote to join Spain.

Mr. Shaw said that following the referendum, Britain would be prepared for further talks with Spain concerning Gibraltar.

Jaime de Pines of Spain, who had asked to participate in the Committee's discussions of the issue, declared that Britain's presence on Gibraltar was tantamount to dismemberment of Spain's national unity and territorial integrity.

He said that Britain had not consulted Spain on holding the referendum and said that it was an attempt by Britain to mask her intention to keep Gibraltar permanently under British rule.

The Spanish representative said that Britain mixed its sovereignty over a military base with the true interests of Gibraltarians in order to get them to defend British military interests.

The dispute going on, he said, was not between the people of Gibraltar and Spain, as Britain wished to make it

appear, but between Britain and Spain.

As the debate in the Committee continued, Manuel Pérez Guerrero of Venezuela and Iraq's Salim Abdellkader Saleem took the floor to support Spain's position.

Both said that the British referendum would not serve the true interests of the inhabitants of Gibraltar.

## UTHANT REPORTS ON IVORY COAST, GUINEA DISPUTE

ON 15 AUGUST 1967, SECRETARY-GENERAL U THANT ISSUED A REPORT TO ALL UNITED NATIONS MEMBERS on the recent difficulties between Guinea and the Ivory Coast arising from the detention in the Ivory Coast of Guinea's Foreign Minister, Mr. Beavogui Lansina and Mr. Achkar Marof, Guinea's Ambassador to the United Nations.

U Thant has for the past month sought their release and the release of a number of nationals and residents of the Ivory Coast who have been detained in Guinea.

In his report, U Thant states that he was informed by Mr. Arsene Usher, Foreign Minister of the Ivory Coast, that the detention of the Guinean officials had been the consequence of prior arbitrary arrests of the Ivory Coast nationals in Guinea, including the crew of an Ivory Coast fishing vessel.

Mr. Usher said that despite repeated approaches to Guinea, there had been no success in arranging the release of the men.

He requested the Secretary-General to use his good offices to settle the problem so that the Ivory Coast could accede to U Thant's appeal for the release of Foreign Minister Mr. Beavogui and Ambassador Achkar.

In reply to Foreign Minister Usher, the Secretary-General declared that the two situations could not be linked.

The detention of the Guinean Foreign Minister and the UN Ambassador was in contravention of the international agreements on diplomatic immunities to which the Ivory Coast was a signatory, and he stated that a grave precedent had been established.

The situation, U Thant said, had provoked international repercussions which had affected even his own responsibilities as Secretary-General.

## UNITED NATIONS CALL FOR GLOBAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY

A CALL FOR "GLOBAL STRATEGY OF DEVELOPMENT" WAS ISSUED LAST WEEK BY RAUL PREBISCH, SECRETARY-GENERAL OF THE UNITED NATIONS conference on Trade and Development.

He was addressing the Geneva meeting of UNCTAD's 55-Member Trade Development Board.

Mr. Prebisch referred to the dangers of the division of the world into exclusive trading areas, linking industrial cen-

ters with special spheres of economic influence in the southern hemisphere. The technical and scientific progress had brought about certain adverse consequences in the developing countries to absorb modern technology at a desired speed, he said.

While the artificial satellites could communicate ideas and whet the consumer appetites, he pointed out, they were unable to transfer the methods of production required for their satisfaction.
